Mrs. Kusum Jayasinghe completed her secondary education at Musaeus College, Colombo, and went on to obtain her BA degree from the University of Colombo in 1971. obtaining her Associateship in 1984, and she became a Chartered Librarian.

ADVANCEMENTS IN LIS FIELD

"National Library of Sri Lanka establishes new Ethics Review Committee for Library and Information Science Research"

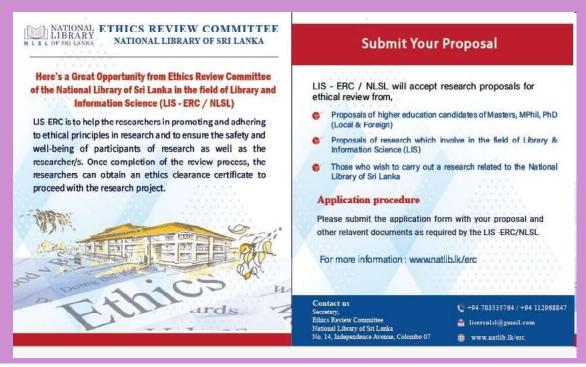
National Library of Sri Lanka (NLSL) has established an Ethics Review Committee (ERC) for Library and Information Science (LIS) research, called ERC-LIS/NLSL. The committee aims to promote high-quality research that follows ethical principles and protects the safety and well-being of participants and researchers. Researchers can obtain an ethics clearance certificate from ERC-LIS/NLSL after completion of the review process

The committee invites proposals from Masters, MPhil and PhD candidates (Local / Foreign) and those who wish to conduct research related to NLSL. The Standard Operational Procedures of ERC-LIS/NLSL requires research proposals to be submitted through the committee secretary by 15th of each month, prior to 14 days of the ERC meeting. Meetings are held once a month during the 4th week of the month. The ERC-LIS/NLSL specifies the format in which proposals should be submitted and considers applications in accordance with relevant documents, informing the decision by the 2nd week of the following month.

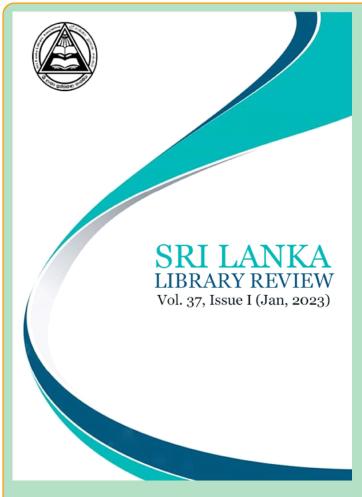
Overall, this new committee from the National Library of Sri Lanka is expected to establish a framework that supports high-quality research, promoting ethical principles that will increase the reliability and effectiveness of research projects, ultimately benefiting the community as a whole.

The Ethics Review Committee for Library and Information Science Research (ERC-LIS/NLSL) at the National Library of Sri Lanka has announced that the submission process for research proposals is now available online. Researchers who are interested in submitting a proposal are required to credit the stipulated processing fee in the application form to People's Bank, Townhall (A/C No.167-1-001-6-3170315) credited to the National Library of Sri Lanka.

This new online submission process provides a convenient and efficient way for researchers to submit their proposals to ERC-LIS/NLSL, ultimately saving time and resources. The committee encourages all interested researchers to take advantage of this new online process.

FEATURE ARTICLE

"Information Technology and Its Impact on Human Life"

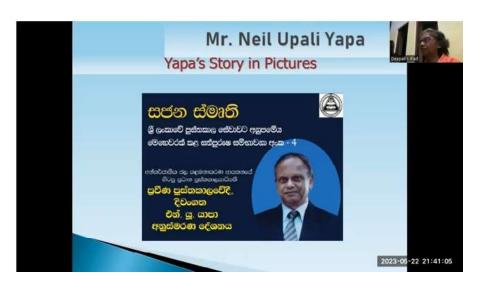

Senate Awards for Research Excellence 2020 & 2021

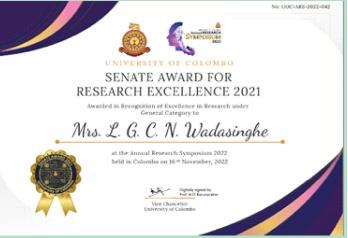

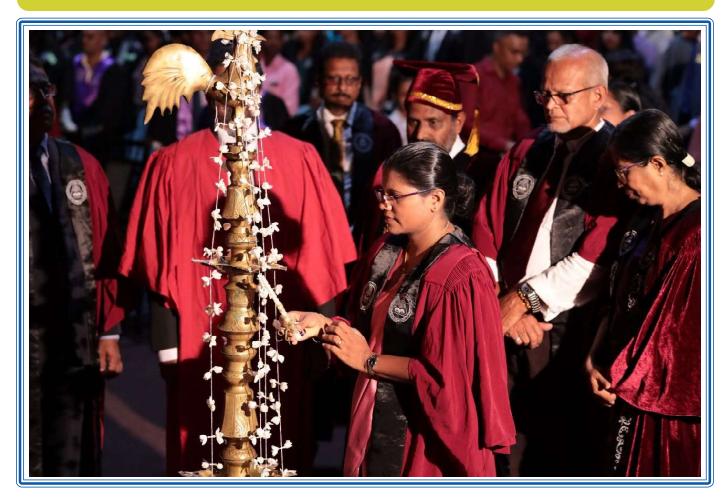
