### Sri Lanka Library Association Receives The National Library Award For Contribution To Reading Promotion And Library Development In Sri Lanka



30<sup>th</sup> On the October 2007 main at the ceremony of the National Reading Month, the Sri Lanka Library

Association was awarded a trophy for its contribution to the promotion of reading in the community and for the continuous programmes conducted by the association for the development of library services in the country.

The ceremony was held at the Sri Lanka Foundation Institute Auditorium with the Hon. Ratnasiri Wickramanayake, the Prime Minister at the Chair. Mr Piyadasa Ranasinghe, President of the SLLA accepted the award on behalf of the association. Our association was well represented at the ceremony with the presence of several council members as well as other members.

In 2004, the National Library and Documentation Services Board (NLDSB) and the Ministry of Cultural Affairs jointly declared the month of October as the National Reading Month as an appreciative measure on the essential function that reading plays in the development of the community. To observe the National Reading Month a variety of inventive and inspiring reading and library services programmes were fulfilled since then.

The theme for this year's programme was "Reading & Development" and poster competitions, poster exhibitions, short story competitions, essay competitions and school seminars were conducted by the NLDSB at district level. Our Association had been throughout organizing reading camps mainly for children, and

several seminars and workshops for the upkeep of the library services. Some of such activities were workshop on best office practices and communication skills, regional workshop on creating a digital library using WINISIS, workshop on research methodology, training programme on audiovisual material management and digital conversion. Nevertheless our activities have taken a special consideration on the Rehabilitation of Tsunami Libraries Project with outreach programmes in the pilot projects and offered opportunities for the respective librarians in those

libraries to participate in our workshops, seminars etc.

Apart from the usual programmes, Mr.J. Ratnayake, the Information and Publicity Officer, participated in a TV interview on reading and usage of libraries.

This trophy was awarded to several other prominent authorities in this field and this is the first time that

the SLLA was awarded a trophy in recognition of its contribution to the development of the library services.

# **Editorial**

### **Encourage reading habits**

With the advancement in the methods of knowledge acquisition in the world, librarians have adopted changes in their profession. In the years gone by, the librarian was a person who methodically organized knowledge (books and other reading material) in the library and waited for the users to make use of it. Today, as a result of the information explosion and other developments in the communication field this outlook has changed. Librarians still, are the experts in organising knowledge and make it available for the users but we have changed our outlook and have extended our services to see the final result of the books in a library being really read / referred and made use of.

There is a saying that you can take a donkey to the water but you cannot make it drink. The librarians, some years back, looked sadly at the rows and rows of unused books in the library and lamented on the unutilization of available knowledge. But today with the vast changes in the information world, the librarians have changed their attitudes, duties, obligations .... They actually introduce various methods to see that the books in the library move in and out of the library and that those are read and made use of. How are our librarians doing this or should do this?.

The basic skills in reading has to be cultivated from the very young age. Awareness in reading and comprehension skills need to be developed at nursery level during the period of schooling of a child. Hence, the school librarians, teacher/librarians, children's librarians and public librarians are the main persons who are entrusted with the important task of motivating the younger generation to cultivate the reading habit.

It is heartening to know that some public libraries and school libraries in the country conduct reading programmes for children to cultivate the reading habit. Some school libraries organize family literacy programmes where the parents participate in reading, reading comprehension and literature progammes along with teachers, librarians and the students. Guided reading is another way of increasing reading comprehension and fluency. This needs training of teachers and librarians in organizing programmes to promote reading. School curricula, classroom environment, family involvement, further improving teacher/ teacher-librarian education/training are some factors that support guided reading. Storybook reading increases the vocabulary and improves poor skills in expression. It is a useful practice to have encourage shared storybook reading in school libraries and in children's libraries, so that children could actively participate in sharing and exchanging knowledge. Dialogic reading among children makes significant improvement in the language and knowledge. Read – aloud is another form of reading that can attract especially the lower age groups. Story telling sessions organized by the library will be a good grounding for the younger generations to start reading.

These are some outreach activities the librarians can organize to attract the children to visit the library and involve in reading. It is a known fact that children who read get higher scores in classroom tests.

# Achievements and Endevours of Member Librarians

#### HIMALI'S STORY :

Ms. N A Himali K Karunaratne is the Librarian of the Payagala Public Library. She is a Bachelor of Laws graduate and an Associate of the SLLA. She has sat for the M A (LIS) of the Kelaniya University and is awaiting results. Prior to her present appointment, Himali was attached to the Sri Subhuthi Memorial Public Library at Waskaduwa in the Kalutara Provincial Council area from 1995-1998 where she first experienced outreach work in a public library.

" My greatest happiness and achievement in my career is to disseminate knowledge to all those who come to my library in search of knowledge irrespective of nationality, class, religion and age" Himali ascertains herself.

"I assumed duties as the Librarian of the Payagala Public Library on 1<sup>st</sup> January 2001. The library was located in a dimly lighted small room in a corner of the premises of the Payagala Provincial Council sub office. The library consisted of one almairah of books, a table and seven chairs for the readers, and the Librarian's seat. There were a little over a thousand books in the collection and the membership was 142 with an active membership of 40. The reason for this poor situation, I understood, was that the Payagala Public Library was burnt by the terrorists in 1989 and a small space was given to shelter what was remaining of the library. I perceived the possibilities of having a good library and did not stop my persuasion to the authorities repeatedly explaining that a suitable building was needed to extend good library services to the public. I made it easy for the authorities by locating a suitable site, which was a closed up nursery school adjoining the Payagala sub-office, to be given to start a new library. I was thrilled when my request was acceded to in February 2001.

I observed the immense outreach services this library can offer to the community and realized that the members could participate in the library activities to help develop the community. My first step was to start a readers club named "Mihisara" with the rich human resource available and with almost zero physical resource. I encouraged the members to participate in aesthetic activities and also to expand the membership while the political leadership donated resources for the library. Our club has participated in cleaning hospital wards, cultural events and religious events. Many trophies were won by the members in the drama and art competitions they took part. I felt contended over the opportunity given to the community to expose their talents. Most of the books borrowed by members were lost during the tsunami. Not a single book that was issued was returned after the tsunami. I explored ways to fill up the loss of books in the library. On my request to the Sri Lanka Library Association, National Library Services and Documentation Board, Local Government Librarians Association of the Western Province and to the people of the area I was able to develop a book collection to a level that was better than what it was.

Today, after 6 hard years, I can boast of reference, lending, reading and children's sections in my library and the resource collection stands close upon 5000. There was only one assistant in 2001, and it has now increased to three which helps to give an efficient service to the members.

Apart from the general collection, I maintain a collection of Parliamentary Acts and a collection of newspaper articles. *Continued on page 07*

#### Beirut named "World Book Capital 2009."

UNESCO has announced the nomination of Beirut as the "World Book capital 2009" in July 2007. Beirut is the ninth city to be designated World Book Capital, after, Madrid (2001), Alexandria (2002). New Delhi (2003), Antwerp (2004), Montreal (2005), Turin (2006), Bogota (2007) and Amsterdam (2008). The city of Beirut was selected " in the light of its focus on cultural diversity, dialogue and tolerance, and its diverse and stimulating programme."

Every year, UNESCO, International Publishers Association (IPA), International Booksellers Federation (IBF) and International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions designate a city as World Book capital for the 12 months between two celebrations of World Book and Copyright Day (23 April).

This initiative is a collaborative effort between representatives of principal stakeholders in the book sector and the cities which have committed themselves to promote books and reading. *IFLA Journal* 33:3(2007)

#### **Encourage reading habits**

I have started a collection of photographs of Sri Lankan and foreign writers and am in the process of starting an inter-library co-operation network among the public libraries in the Beruwela Provincial Council area. As I wished to keep abreast with the development in technology, on my initiative, Colour Craft Lanka Apparel Company situated in Payagala donated a computer to my library which has assisted me to have some sections computerised.

My mission statement is " Our duty is to see that the physical and human resources of the library are developed and the resources are utilized to nurture a desire for the public to indulge in reading and to enhance their knowledge and appreciation of literature and to provide a suitable surrounding for this." As a result of implementing this statement which showed worthwhile results in 2003 I was awarded the second place as the best officer in the Kalutara District while under category of respective institutions I was placed first.

#### SLLA TV Programme for the Reading Month

The publicity programme of the SLLA for the year 2007/2008 commenced with a TV interview in the <u>Sanda Nimnaya</u> programme on the Rupavahini channel on 29<sup>th</sup> October 2007.

Mr J. Ratnayake, Publicity and Information Officer participated in this programme. The month of October was declared as the Month of Reading by the National Library Services and Documentation Board.



At the interview Mr Ratnayake briefly discussed the importance of reading in relation to the development of the society and the active participation of LIS Institutions and SLLA in particular, in this aspect. He explained that correct guidance and assistance in searching and selection of good reading material play a major role in cultivating good morals and reading habits and stressed on the vital and important role to be played by the parents to guide the children to propagate good reading habits.

He further viewed that directing the public towards various social, agricultural and technological information resources would help to create constructive awareness and application of modern technologies will develop the economy of the country and enhance the living standards of the mankind.

#### Our Reading Programme in the Month of Reading – October 2007

In keeping with the National Library Services and Documentation Board declaring the month of October 2007 as the Reading Month, the Sri Lanka Library Association organized a reading programme particularly in the out stations to bring awareness to the community on reading.

Three programmes were held in the North Central, Wayamba and Uva provinces. The North Central programme was held in Anuradhapura / Kekirawa, Wayamba programme in Puttalam and Uva programme in Moneragala.



**Wayamba Province** – Two seminars were held on the 23<sup>rd</sup> October 2007. The Municipal Council extended support to make this programme a success. The seminar was conducted in Sinhala and Tamil media. The morning session was allocated to school children and the afternoon session to the librarians in the Puttalam District. Mr Piyadasa Ranasinghe, Mr G M P B Gallaba, Mr. Uditha Alahakone and Ms D G A S Malkanthi were the resource persons. This event was pleasantly organized with a cultural show.

**North Central Programme** – This was held on the 28<sup>th</sup> September 2007 at the Kekirawa Public Library. The Chairman of the Provincial Council extended his fullest support to make this event a success. Mr Piyadasa Ranasinghe, Mr G M P B Gallaba and Mr Uditha Alahakone conducted a seminar for the A, L. students of the area to enlighten them on the benefits of reading. The second programme was for the librarians in the North Central Province on the same topic. A heartening outcome of this programme was that Anuradhapura Provincial Council was willing to offer a centre to conduct the DIPLIS course with the anticipation of the SLLA providing the resource persons.

**Uva Province** – The seminar was held on the 29<sup>th</sup> October 2007. Mr.G.M.P.B. Gallaba, Mr. H.M.Gunaratnebanda, Mr. Uditha Alahakone and Mr. Nimalasena from Badulla library were the resource persons who conducted the seminar. The Uva branch of the NLSDB and the Badulla Public Library extended their keen support to our programme. Five schools in the district participated in the seminar on awareness on reading and the afternoon programme was for the librarians in the province and was based on the same theme. A useful outcome of this seminar was that the Local Government authorities offered to pay half the course fees of our students attached to the Local Government Service in the Uva Province.
